<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Degree College Surankote is a co-educational institution which came into existence on 29 June, 2011 vide Govt. Order No: 264-Hr. Edu. Of 2011, Dated: 29-06-2011 of Department of Higher Education, Jammu and Kashmir. The college is affiliated to University of Jammu and is recognised by UGC under section 2(f) and 12 (b) of UGC Act, 1965. It is the only college in the entire tehsil of Surankote of district-Poonch of Jammu and Kashmir leading to the production of undergraduates. The college is situated within the lap of mountainous range of Peer Panjal region of Middle Himalaya. It is worthwhile to mention here that it has 11 feeding Higher Secondary School in its vicinity with annual student progression of about 1800 to 2000 per year to undergraduate level. It is catering the needs of 90,298 peoples of tehsil Surankote as per 2011 census. It initially started its functioning from the building of Govt Higher Secondary School (Boys) Surankote with arts stream only, with a mere 198 number of students admitted in the first academic session i.e 2012-13. In the year 2017, sanction was also accorded for the introduction of Science Stream vide Govt. Order No 448-HE of 2017, Dated 01/08/2017, and subsequently the admission in the science stream was made from the academic session 2018-19. The college shifted to its own campus in the month of Feb., 2019 and is currently functioning from two buildings namely Academic Block and Administrative Block. the college is progressing exponentially, the face-to-face student strength has reached up to 1066 in the session 2021-22. At present 19 subjects are being taught in the college in 36 different subject combinations leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science.

- The college caters to the needs of diversity of students, majority of which belongs to socially underprivileged categories like SC, ST, OBC and Pahari Speaking Peoples (PSP).
- The College has taken a significant lead in gender parity and strengthening of communal harmony.
- Complete adoption of CBCS since 2016-17.
- Gradual progression towards complete e-governance and automation.
- Fully networked campus with needful surveillance.
- More than 80% of the faculty hold MPhil/PhD degree.
- The student-teacher ratio is 39:1
- The college faculty
 - publish their books, chapters and research findings in Journals of National and International repute:
 - engages in faculty exchange programmes
 - participates in and organises national/international conferences

- College is located in the centre of town which is accessible from all the sides through public transport facility.

Institutional Weakness

- The college being a non-autonomous cannot implement various academic programmes sou moto as per the guidelines of NEP 2020.
- Limited subject diversity when compared to the wide choice of possibilities in the broad field of education.
- In-adequate regular / permanent staff in the College.
- Lack of trained non-teaching staff in Library, Laboratories, establishment section and office.
- Non-availability of corporate sector in the region for campus placement.
- Transferable faculty.
- Procuring financial resources for upgradation of infrastructure and developmental projects is often a challenge, which results in either stalling or shelving development works in the college.

- Despite furnishing DPRs to higher authorities for Chowkidar Hut, Students Hostel, Additional Classrooms, Department of Geography and Physical Education, approval and release of funds is pending.
- Student intake is increasing but leveraging teachers' sanctioned strength has resulted in constraints in offering multiple options for various discipline in the undergraduate (Choice Based Credit Scheme) curriculum.
- Continuing engagement and commitment to college welfare among the alumni is not yet strong. The Alumni Relations Cell (ARC), despite its enduring hard-work, finds it challenging to form an extensive alumni base and draw support from them in matters related to student progression, financial support, and career prospects (for present students).
- No separate indoor stadium for various indoor games.

Institutional Opportunity

- Scope for Research in Solar energy due to the strategic and critical topography of the region.
- Linkages and industrial collaborations can be developed
- There are huge avenues of training of un-skilled human resource in the field of horticulture, sericulture, agriculture, fisheries, food processing, renewable energy, tourism and floriculture by introducing these courses in the college curriculum at the entry point.
- The COVID-19 pandemic has catalysed an opportunity to re-invent modes and methods of teaching. Both Students and teachers have adapted to new modes of engagement in several online platforms like Zoom, Google Meet, Wise App and Google Classroom. Teaching-learning process has been enhanced and supplemented by quality e-resources. This has opened up opportunities for developing MOOC content by the faculty.
- To provide specialised technology- based education, the college is looking for opportunities for collaboration with other specialized agencies in the field of technology.
- There is ample scope for building linkage with non-government organisations and corporate sectors for placement

Institutional Challenge

- Generation of employability in the absence of corporate sector and industries in the region.
- Maintenance and sustenance of classroom ICT gadgetry.
- A strong aptitude for research needs to be cultivated among the students.
- Owing to transferable nature of faculty and increased workload of teaching, carrying out research in the college is a challenge.
- Due to infrastructure and faculty strength mismatch the purpose of CBCS cannot be fulfilled in true spirit despite of the best efforts by the college. Students are restricted to limited options for discipline and elective subjects.
- Owing to the dependence on approval from external authority, introduction of new programmes of study remains a challenge.
- It is challenging to establish collaborative programmes with institutions of repute at national and international level.
- Campus area is insufficient to meet the future development, extension and to establish the fields of required dimensions of various outdoor games.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Govt. Degree College Surankote is affiliated to the University of Jammu. As per the UGC guidelines, the college runs all programmes based on the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), thus providing students with the option of choosing courses as per their area interests. The schedule and duration of all programmes is based on the University guidelines. Furthermore, the college meticulously plans its academic sessions, thus ensuring timely preparation of academic calendars, timetables and the allotment of courses to the teaching faculty. Periodic assessments of students are undertaken through assignments and tests in a time-bound manner. Syllabi taught across all the programmes are based on latest trends and study, and several faculty members have also been involved in curriculum development.

In addition to the regular programmes, the college offered one certificate course in computer during the academic session 2020-21. The college thrust upon experiential learning through field trips. The college is running many courses which are instilling professional ethics, gender equality, human rights and sensitivity to environmental concerns. More specifically, College also organizes extension lectures on diverse topics of cross-cutting issues through the expert from other colleges and departments for the betterment of students.

Regular feedback from the students, alumni, and faculty also ensures appropriate action towards addressing any gap in student progression and overall college development.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College admission process is administered and executed with absolute transparency and in compliance with norms, statues and rules of the University of Jammu. As there is no capping on intake capacity, so all the students who are eligible and apply for seeking admission in B.A. and B.Sc programs are admitted irrespective of their categories to which they belong. The institution encourages students from diverse background and teachers assess the academic proficiency of students based on their performance in classroom discussions, tests/assignments, seminars, quizzes and their performance in term end examination. Special strategies are adopted to overcome the learning barriers. Student centric methods such as experiential learning, field trips, participation in different activities are adopted to enrich the teaching learning process. National conferences, workshops, extension lectures and seminars are organized in the college to provide opportunities to student for their academic growth and development.

The teacher wise mentorship is allotted for the personal, emotional and academic wellbeing of the students. The current year Mentor-Mentee Ratio is 1:39. Blended teaching-learning methods are adopted by employing both ICT and traditional classroom practices to make learning more effective and meaningful. The COVID-19 pandemic threw up new vistas of online teaching-learning, thus ensuring continuity as well as change in learning experiences.

The college has well qualified, trained and committed faculty, 80% of which are holding the doctorate degree and all of them are full time teachers. The average teaching experience is 2.64 years in this institution. The low teaching experience of the faculty of this institution is due to the transferable nature of job, if the experience of teachers rendered in other institutions is also taken into account, then the experience graph will surely rise as the college has faculty members with more than 13 years of teaching experience. In order to ensure the transparent and fair internal examination system the college has robust internal assessment mechanism. Assessment-related grievances are addressed properly. Broad objectives and outcome of graduate programmes are conveyed to the students during orientation programme. POs and PSOs are displayed on the college website also.

Research, Innovations and Extension

In comparison to the age, college has developed enough infrastructure to support the teaching-learning process. In future college is planning to start research, proposal of which are being submitted to Higher Education Department for approval.

Academic activities like conferences, seminars, webinars, workshops, field trips & faculty exchange programmes are conducted periodically which inspires the students and faculty members towards new approaches and provide a platform to share their research finding and knowledge.

The institution believes in inculcating skills among the young learners and accordingly the college has offered skill course in computer in collaboration with NIELIT, Jammu.

The students are regularly updated with different scholarship schemes. The college has conducted many activities in collaboration with different governmental& non- governmental organisations. The institution has signed MoU for academic exchange with neighboring colleges.

The college faculty has edited chapters, published books and their research findings in the journals of national and international repute in the field of science, social science and humanities. The college has been effectively spreading awareness and sensitizing the students through their involvement in outreach activities and extension activities. The college has constituted various clubs for the implementation of different missions, schemes and programmes of national and intrest. The students of the college overwhelmingly participates in health awareness camps, voters awareness programme, literary & cultural activities, seminars, quizzes, yoga, rallies and poster making competitions. All important days notified by government are celebrated regularly in the college with the aim to develop feelings of patriotism and ethical values among the students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Government Degree College Surankote is a new budding college established in 2011, which is continuously striving hard to upgrade its physical, academic and IT infrastructure so as to equip and acquaint the young learners with the upcoming requirements and demands of the society in the changing scenerio of new education policy. After running for about 8 years in Govt. Boys Higher Secondary School Surankote it has shifted to its own newly constructed building in 2019. It has two main blocks viz, Administrative Block and Academic Block. Administrative block has an Auditorium, Gym cum Yoga Centre, Principal Chamber, Establishment and Account Section, IQAC Cell, Library, Women Development Cell and Physical Department.

Academic block has science laboratories, browsing centre, computer lab, lecture halls. The college has all basic facilities for smooth teaching learning delivery. Most of the classes have been converted to smart class rooms by installing Interactive Flat Panel Displays and Podium cum Projectors. To make them fully functional the uninterrupted power supply through UPS, inverters and gen set has been ensured. Every department has been provided computers and printers to be used for preparing teaching learning material. The office is also equipped with required number of computers for administrative work.

Keeping in view the growing strength of students which has significantly increased from 198 in academic session 2012-13 to 1066 in current academic session, the college has submitted the DPRs for separate Geography and Computer Departments, extra class rooms, hostels for students, Physical Education Department and Chowkidar Hut. The college has enough space for carrying out outdoors games. The library is continuously enriched over the years, online resources in the form of N-LIST has been subscribed and campus is Wi-Fi enabled.

College has adequate clean drinking water facility and water dispensers are installed for students at various locations. Further the fire extinguishers have been placed at various strategic and reachable locations to overcome any eventuality.

Student Support and Progression

The College aims at the holistic development of students to facilitate their better future. Therefore, the college takes many proactive steps to help the students in their academic and other endeavours.

Student Support

Around 71% students have got government scholarship in the last 5 years under various schemes. The skill enhancement activities of the students are organised by departments and committees. The College has signed a MoU with NIELIT Jammu and provided soft and hard skill training in Computer Application. In addition to this, various skill development courses are also offered by the institution. The college has a separate Browsing Centre with Wi-Fi facility for the students to cater their academic needs. College has planned to introduce the skill courses in Food Processing and Music & Fine Arts for which some procurement has already been made.

The NSS and NCC units of the college are actively involved in various cultural and extracurricular activities. College organises Educational Tours and Field Trips for the students to get practical knowledge in respective fields. The college has established a Psychological Counselling Cell to address physical, emotional and mental health issues and to improve their sense of well being at the time of distress.

Student Progression

College has also established a Career Counselling Cell that provides coaching to the students for appearing in various competitive examinations. The Placement Committee of the college organizes training activities for Final Year students on career planning, personality development and internship.

The college has physical education department for running sports activities in the campus. The students actively participate in competitions at intercollegiate and national level. College also organises regular sports and cultural activities.

Redressal Mechanism

The college has an effective Anti-ragging, Anti-Sexual Harassment, Internal Complaints Committee and Student Grievance Redressal Committees in place. College has also established Women Empowerment Cell that organises various programmes for the betterment of the female students.

For giving due representation to the studets a "student body" is elected to participate in various activities of the

college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The management system provides strategic directions for sustained development in sync with the Vision and Mission of the college. The Management displays ethical leadership which is visible in the consensus–oriented, participatory style of governance.

There are 25 well defined policies covering overall functioning of the college for ensuring quality education and training to the human resource.

The plans for the development of the college on all fronts are drawn up in true participatory manner as the decisions are always taken in consultation with all stakeholders. This also ensures the decentralization and participative management.

Welfare measures for all the teaching, non-teaching and support staff are taken to promote a conducive, healthy work ambience. Feedback is taken, and analysed and corrective measures are implemented.

To develop the leadership qualities among the students the college is providing a platform to the students to organise various academic, sports, cultural and extension activities. As such a student body is constituted during the academic sessions and student representatives are also included in various committees.

The college makes concerted efforts to mobilise funds from the government for development and academic activities.

The IQAC spearheads developmental activities and has institutionalised numerous practices for overall quality sustenance like ICT based teaching learning system, Creation of Sports Facility and Development of Drinking Water Facility. It also periodically revises the teaching learning process and takes various steps which lead to improvement in the quality of teaching learning system.

All financial dealings are transparent & audited internally.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The College is committed to a strong value system with an emphasis on ethics. The discipline and safe environment in the campus have led to the college becoming an institute of choice for budding learners of the area.

Gender equality is promoted by organising various programmes in the college on gender equality, gender sensitization and self-defence to generate an inclusive culture. An Internal Complaint Cell is in place to address any difficulty faced by the women. Safety and Security is ensured through an extensive network of CCTV cameras and discipline committee. Provision of common room and exclusive amenities creates comfort zone for girls. Various committees like Sexual Harassment, Discipline Committee, and Anti-Ragging Committee ensure discipline and harmonious environment in college.

Sustained efforts are made to create and maintain environmental consciousness by organising different drives

like anti-plastic drive, reduce reuse strategies for paper, solid and liquid waste management initiatives to create an eco-friendly campus. Cleanliness Drives were organized for the promotion of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan mission and student's enrichment. The college is using LED lights and solar inverters for power conservation. For judicial use of water the college has its own submercible pump and kacha pound for harvesting rain water. The College facilitates the differently abled students by providing ramps, divyaang friendly washroom, wheel chair and human assistance in the form of scribe if so required. National festivals, birth anniversaries of great leaders are observed. Excursions and celebrations to promote social cohesion are planned periodically. Programmes focusing on universal values, fundamental rights and duties are incorporated in college activity calendar. The college ensures transparency in functioning, displays core values and adheres to code of conduct and professional ethics.

For maintaining transparency, uniformity and timely completion of internal assessment record a centralised scheme of internal examination has been implemented as one of the best practice.

Over the period of time the instituion has shifted from classical teaching learning system (chalk and talk methods) to ICT based creative teaching learning.

The Institute distinguishes itself from the rest by focusing on the holistic development of students.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The College is affiliated to University of Jammu, hence the scope in planning the interdisciplinary approach sou motu is limited. With respect to New Education Policy, University of Jammu has issued a circular No F.Acd/H//21/10392-10436 dated 09-12-2021 to work out the Syllabi and Scheme of UG programmes by 30th of Dec 2021 for speedy
	 implementation of NEP. Within the broader contour outlined by the University, GDC Surankote is maintaining multidisciplinary approach in following ways: 1. Choice Based Credit System had been introduced during the academic session 2016-17. College is offering maximum flexibility of choice of the courses within the stipulated limit set by the

	university. At present 18 subjects are being taught in the college with 36 different subject combinations. Number of courses offered in BA/BSc have been mounted from 103 in 2016-17 to 232 in 2020-21. 2. Skill courses are offered without any impediment of subject combination, so that any student from any subject combination can opt any of the skill courses across the B.A and B.Sc programmes. 3. In order to fetch and arrest the interest of students in opting the subjects a counselling cell is in place for their grievance and subsequent redressal. 4. Mathematics, Geography and Languages are some common subjects currently running in the institution which are integrating humanities with arts and science. 5. In the academic year 2020-21 institution has signed an MoU with National Institute of Electronics and Information Technology (NIELIT) and has trained some students in Computer Skills.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Department of Higher Education Jammu & Kashmir has issued circular DC/HE/Circular/2021 Dated 07/12/2021 for starting B.A and B.Sc honours degree courses with multiple entry and exit points from academic session 2022-23. Opting courses under SWAYAM could not be introduced during the period of lockdown and college is planning to start as soon as possible. This college has also sent a proposal for running B.VOC course with provision of multiple entry and exit points. This proposal is subject to the approval of Higher Education Department Jammu and Kashmir UT.
3. Skill development:	College is running various skill courses from semester III to VI and it is compulsory to opt at least one skill course in each semester the students have ample flexibility to chose any skill course of their interest. In this regard some procurement of needed equipment has been made in 2020-21 but running of same is still pending at the level of Higher Education Department of Jammu and Kashmir UT.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The institution is affiliated to University of Jammu and adheres to the curriculum designed and prescribed by the University. However, within the framework provided by the University, the curriculum is operationalized keeping in mind the requirements and resources of the college. Every Head of Department of respective department is a member of board of studies and thus took part in designing of the curriculum. With the objective of achieving excellence in education, the institution ensures the following:

- Academic calendar is prepared at the commencement of each academic session depicting schedule of class work, internal assessment tests, examinations and other curricular activities.
- Along with general time table of the college, each department is asked to prepare its individual departmental time table so as to allocate the theory and laboratory courses to faculty members according to skills and relevant experience of the teacher. As students have to reach college by commuting from distant places daily, the time table is framed in such a manner that it remains convenient even for long distance commuters to attend all their classes.
- Since the introduction of Choice Based Credit System in the year 2016, a wide range of Skill Enhancement, Discipline Specific Elective and Generic Courses are offered to the students.
- A Counseling Committee is constituted at the time of admission which properly guides the students to choose combination based on their area of interest, infrastructure of college and future scope of a particular course. It also helps the students in addressing various issues related to admission process.
- In order to maintain the student-teacher ratio as per the norms of Higher Education Department the students are allotted various sections based on the strength and subject combinations alloted to the them.
- Workload for each subject is calculated and accordingly full-time teachers/guest faculty is engaged on the basis of requirement.
- Each department is given freedom to determine its own pace and schedule of completion of syllabus as per the requirement of each course.
- Students are taught by using modern ICT tools in order to make the teaching more interactive, practical and engrossing.
- Besides the WiFi connection in the campus for browsing online learning resources, a considerable number of quality textbooks are also made available for consultation.
- Respective faculty members also prepare and maintain course files and other academic records, which contain all the information necessary for the effective delivery of the curriculum.
- Academic progress and student's attendance for each individual subject is continuously monitored and documented.
- Regular Class tests are conducted for each subject along with viva voce. Moreover, remedial classes are also conducted for the students having poor academic performance.
- In order to augment the delivery of curriculum through participative learning, seminars,

conferences, workshops, extension lectures, quiz, symposia, field trips are also conducted.

- Apart from this teaching faculty is regularly encouraged to attend refresher courses, general orientation courses, FDPs and to participate in seminars / conferences / workshops etc. to update their knowledge and refine their skills.
- Regular feedback is also taken from students both formally and informally regarding different aspects of curriculum and same is duely worked upon.

The institution strictly adheres to its own academic calendar with respect to continuous internal evaluation within the broader contour of affiliated university framework. This calendar is encapsulated in prospectus of the institution and uploaded on college website before the start of each academic session for its wide circulation.For the sake of execution of planned activities well in time, our academic calendar depicts schedules of;

- 1. Orientation Programmes in the classes by the teachers i.e. about scheme of examination.
- 2. Curriculum and Co-curricular Activities.
- 3. Celebration of all international and national days.
- 4. Conduct of internal evaluations (internal assessment theory as well as practical).
- 5. Tentative dates of external examinations (theory as well as practical).

Right from inception of each academic session all faculty members conduct their theory and practical classes smoothly according to the institutional master time table. These timetables are uploaded on the website and displayed on notice boards, which helps in monitoring the regularity of classes. Timely completion of syllabus, revision and internal evaluation are carried out in concordance with the schedule listed in the academic calendar.

The performance of students is assessed continuously. Tests, assignments, presentations and mock practical exams are held in time bound manner. Both students and parents have access to internal assessment and attendance records. Internal awards are displayed to students for inviting any objections. Marked answer sheets are shown to them. They are given chances for improvements as many times as students wishe to.

Final internal assessments are duly signed by the teacher in charge, Head of Department and Principal. Thereafter it is subjected to verification by an external committee duly constituted by the university.

All faculty members participate in the central evaluation process to ensure timely declaration of results of university examinations. This facilitates commencement of the new session as per schedule.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Students who join the college after passing class 12th are from different boards of examination and as such, they are usually a heterogeneous group having different levels of competence. Initially class12th scores are taken as one indicator to judge the student's "learning ability". As the classes start, the slow learners and advance learners are detected by the teachers during their lectures in the classroom, discussions and class tests.Further judgement in subsequent years is based on performance in the mid-semester evaluations/ external exam/ activity conducted/ their level of alertness. Remedial measures are taken according to the needs of students with different levels of competence and also to narrow the intrestice between two.

Steps taken for Advanced Learners:

- Provided with a good collection of books for overall comprehension and understanding of advanced knowledge.
- Enhancing their level of understanding to make presentations and participation in various seminars and debates organized at intra and inter collegiate level.
- Toppers are felicitated on the Annual Day every year.
- Students are chosen as class representatives, Members of students Union to provide them an opportunity to display their leadership skills and qualities.
- Nominated to represent college in inter-collegiate and University level competitions.
- Motivated to set high goals for themselves and counseled to prepare for entrance and competitive examinations like UPSC, JKPSC, University Entrance Exams etc.
- Educational tours are also conducted by various departments so that student's horizon of thinking and intellect is enhanced.

Steps taken for Slow Learners:

- At the outeset, a meticulous analysis of their needs is being being conducted to assess their problems with remedial measures.
- Teachers coordinate with parents of slow learners so that their needs can be catered to.
- Mentor-mentee interaction keeps faculty in constant touch with students, iron out academic and personal issues. This stimulates overall personality development. Thanks to the modern technology these days, the distance between student and teacher has been minimized, especially during Covid-19 pandemic by virtue of online mode of teaching.
- The slow learners who mostly hail from poor back ground are being provided with financial support to meet their requirements like admission and examination fee. Further college Financial Aid cum Scholarship Committee ensures that such slow learners get timely scholarships and financial help through college and social welfare department.
- Remedial classes and regular class test, are taken for academically weaker students, Accordingly, suggestions for improvement are made.
- Slow learners are given more attention both inside and outside the class. They are encouraged to

take part in cocurricular activities and multiple career options are suggested to all students keeping in mind their aptitude and interest.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Government Degree College Surankote enhances the learning experience of students by conducting and organising student centric programmes throughout the year. The college has made its integral policy to supplement the classroom with the experimental learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies.

Experimental Learning and Participative Learning

- Experimental learning is promoted by analysis of experiments after practical classes (Science Departments) and sensitization is done through celebration of various important days like National Voter's Day, AIDS day, World Water Day, Swachta Abhiyan, Drug de-addiction week, etc.
- Department specific activities like one-day field trips, study tours, excursions, outreach activities which are part of curriculum of EVS, Geography, Botany, Zoology and Sociology, are organized.
- Group discussions, debates and seminars on social, economic and other issues are regularly conducted in the institution in order to promote positive thinking, active listening and effective communicating and defending skills.
- Students are encouraged to participate in various co-curricular activities organized in collaboration with prestigious organizations (NGO's) and Govt. departments. This gives them an exposure to the work and views of leading experts of various fields, academicians, administrators and other activists on societal and environmental issues.
- Students are encouraged to actively participate in sports competitions to hone, explore and exhibit their talent in a variety of games to foster a spirit of togetherness and leadership.
- More recently teachers resort to audio-visual aids like the use of Smart Classrooms, PPT presentations etc. in teaching. This is,definitely more student-centric, for it ensures active

participation of students in learning process, it minimizes the gap in communication, it concretizes graphs and designs which remain abstract if they are described without being demonstrated.

- NSS unit adopted villages where the students were involved to save water bodies.
- A national level capacity building tour to Gujrat and Jamnagar was organized in which students visited different industrial sites and other important places.
- In order to impart computer skill among the students a certificate course in computer application was completed in collaboration with NIELIT Jammu by signing an MoU through which 50 students were trained, where college has provided the physical facility and trainer was provided by the NIELIT at the cost of Rs 11,22,600/- which was funded by the college.

Problem Solving Methodologies

On regular basis assignment & similar subject related challenges are given to students to check the level of understanding of the subject. In order to enhance problem solving capabilities of the student's certain hypothetical issues are put forth before them and the responses are sought from the students. These responses are analyzed and judged for their reasonability and applicability (In this regard some students attended workshops on "Innovation Incubation and Training -IIT 2021"). Further students are allowed to work in groups to discuss concepts and find solutions to the problems.

The faculty uses the latest ICT tools to tide over the monotony of the conventional teaching learning process and to make learning more interesting, engrossing and student friendly. The college has upgraded in terms of use of ICT and technology driven instruction in the classrooms. The college has upgraded most of the Lecture Theaters and Labs with latest technology by installing Interactive panels and Smart Boards with Projectors which are provided with internet connectivity and Power backup facility..

- The college has around 48 Desktops, 04 Laptops, 06 Interactive panel, 03 Smart Boards with Projectors and 100 MBPS fiber line from BSNL-FTTH Surankote.
- Classrooms and laboratories are equipped with Interactive Panel, Smart Boards and are Wi-Fi enabled to facilitate teachers to directly stream web pages and videos.
- Printers and scanners are available in departments and library.
- Wi-fi routers are installed to provide easy internet access to faculty and students.
- The college library has access to 6000+ e-journals and 31,35,000+ e-books accessible on https://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in/.
- Faculty regularly consults and shares material from e-books, web pages, You- tube videos and other relevant resources.
- The open educational resources such as NPTEL, you tube videos, e- journals etc. are assessed by teachers and recommended to the students (after considering their authenticity).
- Teachers made a swift transition from classroom to online teaching during the lockdown due to

COVID-19 pandemic. Platforms such as Wise App, Zoom, Google Classroom, were used to create virtual classrooms.

- Online modes like Email, Google Forms and Google Classroom, Wise App are used to collect assignments, conduct tests and practical examinations as well as for sharing learning material, practice questions and other e-resources.
- Teachers use social media platforms like WhatsApp and Telegram to connect with the students individually and collectively beyond the classroom for giving extra information and support to students.
- Some Teachers of the college also participated in e-content development under e-content development initiative of J&K Higher Education.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Govt Degree College Surankote is an affiliate college of the University of Jammu and as such is guided by the regulations formulated at university level in all the matters pertaining to syllabi, examination and evaluation. The institution ensures that all students are aware of the examination and evaluation process through the college prospectus which is updated annually. Further the interaction of new entrants with principal and faculty is facilitated at the commencement of the session, where students are acquainted with rules and regulations of the affiliating university, examination and evaluation process.

• Guidelines for teachers and students regarding the internal assessment are prepared as per the university rules, which are made available to all faculty. Examination committee and the concerned

teachers of the subject of the college convey the basic structure of the internal assessment of practical and theory with the guidelines for dealing with absentees.

- Centralized date-sheet for test/submission of assignments is notified on the college notice boards and also conveyed to the students by the teachers in their respective classes (during Covid-19 same was done through WhatsApp and Wise App Groups), at least 15 days in advance.
- The question papers prepared by concerned teacher, are printed just 15 minutes before the commencement of examination. Inside the examination hall, attendance sheet is circulated and those who have not appeared in the exam are treated as absent.
- After evaluation the answer scripts of the internal assessment tests are shown to the students for their satisfaction and self appraisal. Internal assessment marks are also shared with students through WhatsApp and WiseAppGroups.
- The students who could not appear in the test due to some valid reasons like NCC activities, sports activities and other unavoidable circumstances, there is provision of re-test for them and also for weaker students for improvement. The result of the internal assessment is checked and verified by internal assessment committee of the college and then by the inspection team framed by the University of Jammu. A proper record of the internal assessment is maintained in all teaching departments.
- The tests and evaluation process are executed as per the academic calendar of the institution.

Response:

As per the University guidelines college has adopted two effective and distinctive ways to address examination related grievances in a transparent, time-bound, and efficient manner.

Internal Examination

Date is fixed for students to consult the concerned teacher to check the evaluated answer sheets and settle the issues if any. The college has introduced a practice which requires a student to sign a document affirming their satisfication with the w evaluation. To make the process transparent a date is notified and the notification is displayed on notice board or shared with students through any Social Media platform (especially during Covid-19 Pandemic). They may raise their grievances regarding the marks awarded to them with the faculty concerned. In rare cases if student's grievances are not addressed satisfactorily, students are free to approach their mentor, or the teacher-in-charge for redressal. Intervention by the Head of Institution can be sought in extraordinary cases.

External Examination

As regards the external examination, students appear in examination hall allotted by the university. The answer sheets bear code to maintain confidentiality of evaluation and examiners other than the teachers of the college evaluate the scripts within the alloted time frame.

After the declaration of results, the students can apply for re-evaluation of their answer sheets if they are not satisfied with the award given to them within 15 days of the declaration of the result. The notification for the same is displayed on the university website. The college gives wide publicity to the dateline for re-evaluation, and process of the applications.

Further student can apply for re-checking also in which answer sheet is shown to the student and is rechecked.

For errors like mark sheet reflecting student as absent, result withheld, result later on due to typing mistakes or any other reason, the internal assessment committee sends the duly certified records to the university for the necessary correction in favour of the student.

- The feedbacks forms are collected from the students at institute level and at the end of the semester the review is done on the achievement of the same.
- Students are provided opportunities to interact with senior students and alumni to learn about their experiences and career paths, so that they are encouraged and motivated to chart out similar roadmaps for their own future.

- NSS office.

4. ICT Facility: The classrooms/lecture halls, laboratories and multipurpose hall are equipped with interactive panels boards, podium, interactive board, projector system and visualiser. In addition, all the staff members and office are provided computer and printers. Three photocopier are also installed in office, IQAc and library. A full fledge browsing center has also been established.

5. Power backup: The classrooms, browsing centre, staff cabins and offices are provided with a continuous power backup in the form of double battery inverters, online UPS and a 40 KVA Gen Set so as to deal with the power cuts during bad weather.

6. Sports Facility. The physical education department is well equipped with sports related items and equipments. The playground is being developed for various play fields. Space for indoor sports facility has also been created.

7. Sitting Facility for Students. Class rooms are having customized fixed desks and extra desks are also available to be used in the examination for keeping the required distance among the students.

More than 50 cast iron outdoor benches are also kept in different places in campus for students.

8. Surveillance System. In order to maintain discipline and keep vigilance CCTV cameras have been installed at all strategic locations.

9. Information System. Notice boards are installed at every prominent locations for conveying information to the students. They are also used for creative writings, attractive paintings which bring forth the hidden talents of the students. In addition, mentor mentee groups and subject specific WhatsApp groups have also been by the teachers for communication.

10. Drinking Water Facility. College has sufficient water supply in the form of own submersible water pump and water cooler (with UV-R/O filters) to provide purified hot and cold drinking water to students and staff.

11. Learning Facility. The college possesses a well-furnished and resourceful library with more than 10,000 numbers of books. The books are properly maintained in different bookshelves. e-journals and e-books through NLIST (INFLIBNET) are also subscribed offering online access to learning resources.

12. Internet Facility. The campus is having WiFi facility with a bandwidth of above 50mbps.

13. Distance Mode. The college is also having a study centre of Moulana Azad National Urdu University (MANUU) where students persuing their studies through distance mode are offered counseling, guidance and admission facilities besides conduction of their examinations.

Purchase. Teachers-in charge/committee conveners/establishment section gives the requirement to the purchase committee, and purchase committee conevenes the meeting and reccomend the requisite purchases after due deliberations. Thereafter chair execute the purchase as per requirement.

Maintenance

- Physical/academic facilities are maintained in the college by College Development and Purchase Committees. Sometimmes sub committies are also framed to take up the maintenance of facilities
- Discipline committee ensures to maintain silence in the corridors and to avoid loitering by the students.
- Electrical equipment are switched off after use and classrooms/labs are locked in the evening to avoid their damage in wee hours.
- Students are sensitized through code of condcut and orientation programmes to take care of the college property.
- Dustbins have been placed at various places to avoid littering.
- The incinerators have been installed in the girls washrooms for disposing off the sanitary pads.
- Library : All new books and journals are entered into library accession registers and the books are issued and returned from the students as per the notified time and shedule by strictly following the norms of the library. Periodic anti-termite spray are carried out for the upkeeping of books. The faculty members recommends the purchase of books for library as per the requirement of their respective subjects. Reading facilities have been made available in the library for the readers. Different spaces have been earmarked for girls and boys students of the college.
- Science Laboratories: The maintenance of the laboratories falls under the supervision of lab attendants for routine management. Stock registers are methodically maintained and checked by the teachers incharge and are verified by the Principal.
- For timely purchase of consumable and non-consumable items in the laboratories, requirements are proposed through departmental purchase committees and the teachers-in-charge.
- **Sports**: Department of Physical Education supervises the proper maintenance and marking of tracks and grounds. Proper stock registers of procured sports equipments is maintained. Every year the facilities are upgraded and new equipments are added.
- Students use the sports ground for training purpose with prior permission and under the guidance of physical instructor. Students utilises the sports kits and equipment for playing & practicing various games.

6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Response:

Institution works by involving all the stakeholders viz., Chair (Principal), Staff (Teaching and non-teaching) and Students. In order ensure participative management and decentralisations of power different roles are being assigned to different staff members and students at different rungs of ladder.

1. Institutions is comprised of different departments created subject wise. Senior faculty member of respective departments is designated as **Head of Department** who control and command the

working of that very department.

- 2. Faculty from different departments is put together under different **committees**. Committees undertake the work and responsibilities of the institution like college development, discipline, purchase, faculty development, examination etc etc.
- 3. Due representation of students is ensured through formation of **students' body**. Students' body is framed by the elected/unanimously nominated class representatives (CRs) from each section and from both the gender (girls & boys) all of which in turn elect Head Boy and Head Girls. These representatives remain the members of various activities thus participate in decision making besides projecting demand of students through their own constituted body.

Proposal for any activity/ development/ purchase of the college is decided by the concerned committee and tit over to the principal with the minutes of meeting for final approval and execution.

Case Study showing decentralization and participative management is described here as under:

Field Trip

Proposal by Students: Student reading geography as one of the subjects submitted a proposal to the Principal for organizing a field visit.

Action by Chair: Principal of the college forwarded the proposal to the Head of Geography department for discussion and submission of report thereof.

Role of Head of Geography Department: Head of geography department in consultation with rest faculty members and students finalised the dates, itinerary and worked out budgetary requirement. As a **joint management**, student agreed to bear the expenses for luch and institution decided to provide college bus, fuel and faculty members to accompany the tour. With these comments so decided proposal was put to chair for according approval.

Participation of Chair: Principal accorded approval to the recommendations and passed the orders to the co-ordinator accompanying the tour and management for necessary preparation besides releasing the required amount.

Tour Summary: On 28th October 2021, Department Geography organized one day filed trip/tour with joint effort and management of college administration and students. Students got the experience for collection of Rocks samples as well as to identify the different types of relief features in the valley of Surankote.

- Based on the policy towards evaluation and reforms the internal examination of the students have been set up on a pattern of external examination in the following ways:
- Internal assessments of all the subjects are being done on prefixed dates by the examination committee of the college.
- A date sheet for the conduct of assessment tests is circulated well in time so that all the students gets information.
- Special centres of examinations are set up and the staff is deputed by order of the chair in each centre for smooth and fair conduct of the exam.
- Question paper is set and printed by the teacher in charge and is handed over to the staff on duty just before the examination.
- The answer sheets are numbered by machine and supplied to the examination centre on spot.
- Attendance of the students is maintained in each paper on the day of examination.

- In order to maintain transparency the awards of students after evaluation are circulated and displayed among students for inviting any query.
- Absentees are informed through notice for re-examination.
- Chance of reassessment is being provided for improvement and absentees after proper verification of the facts by the examination committee and the teacher incharge.
- Then a notice for the final compilation of assessment awards is circulated by examination committee which duly checked and verified by the examination committee, teacher incharge, head of the department. Principal and then by the external committee appointed by the university from other institutions.

Library.

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• Establishment section is run by Section Officer, Senior Assistant, Junior Assistant and Computer Assistant.

• Lab Assistant is the in charge of Laboratory and Lab Bearer is the menial staff in the lab.

Library Assistant is the non teaching staff in the library.

Two of above are described here under:

1. **ICT based teaching learning system.** In order to create ICT based teaching learning facility following steps were taken and executed:

Ø Interactive flat panel boards were purchased and installed in the class rooms and laboratories as a result of which maximum class rooms have been converted into smart class rooms.

 \emptyset For providing uninterrupted power supply to the smart class rooms for ensuring their working all the times following action have been taken.

• Special Transformer has been installed for college campus.

A 40 KVA gen set has been purchased and made operational during power cuts.

• Double battery inverters have been purchased and installed in order to make the working more economical as running of Gen Set all the time for single class work is a costlier affair.

2. Creation of Sports Facility

.

Following steps have been initiated by IQAC and completed with respect to development of Sports facility in the college campus:

Ø A play ground has been developed by levelling the land and erection of retention cum boundary wall.

Ø Instruments /playing equipments for indoor games and outdoor games were purchased which includes

cricket bowling machine, poles and nets for volley ball, badminton, chess, carrom boards, table tennis, gym, mat for yoga & kabaddi etc.

IQAC periodically reviews the teaching learning process and takes various steps which lead to improvement in the quality of teaching learning system. Two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of reforms are mentioned below.

1.Review of teaching learning through feedback of students and action taken:

- Feedback of students about the teaching learning have been taken and analyzed by IQAC and based on which following steps have been taken to improve the teaching learning system:
- Mentor mentee groups have been created in order to address various issues of the students.
- Based on the feedback analysis all the teachers have been asked to take respective steps like inclusion of participative and problem-solving based teachings trends and techniques. Accordingly field trips were organized by the institution and villages were adopted by the NSS unit for carrying out different activities like water-source (spring) management and swatchta. Quiz competitions (both intra and inter college), student seminars, essay writing competitions, participation in sports at university level are emphasized by IQAC and implemented in letter and spirit.

Incremental improvement made in this regard is that college is able to increase the pass out percentage of students from below 50% at first semester to above 80% in the final semesters.

2. Review of the teaching facilities in the college.

- Feeling the importance of audio-visual aid with modern ICT facilities in teaching, smart class rooms creation was initiated by the IQAC in which following steps have been taken:
- One seminar hall, five class rooms, four labs have been converted to smart classes by installing digital interactive board, projectors, visualizer, podium and interactive panel boards.
- In addition to above computer lab cum browssing centre has also been established.

• Progressively the college is aheading to make the campus fully Wifi enabled.

The College believes in not only heightening awareness among female students about their rights but also sensitizing students towards better implementation of those rights.

- Till date college has not accumulated any e-waste owing to its newly established nature. Very little biomedical waste in the form of dissected out material from the science labs is being produced. Liquid and solid waste is also minimum.
- College has put a blanket ban on the use of polythene.
- No non-degradable product is authorized to be used in the Canteen.

In order to address the little degradable /non-degradable waste coming out from any source college has adopted following measures:

MoU with Municipality. College has signed an MoU with the Municipality in which waste collected in any form in the campus be taken away by Municipality for proper disposal. Under this MoU college has planned to organize awareness program with regards to waste management.

Solid Waste Management:

- Differently coloured covered/pedal-pushed bins are placed across various locations of the campus to keep the solid waste.
- Degradable waste generated in the college is collected in green colored dustbins and nondegradable in blue.
- The degradable waste as and when generated is being put in the pits and covered over by soil.
- Non-degradable waste as and when collected is being given to municipality for disposal.

Liquid waste management:

- Separate bins are designated for liquid waste in the campus.
- Liquid waste coming out of kitchen / washrooms is again poured into the pits dug out at outlets.

Biomedical waste management:

- Little bio-medical waste that is being produced from the science labs after dissection of the specimens is being buried in the pits and covered by soil.
- Incinerators have been installed in washrooms for females for treating medical and clinical waste.

e-Waste Management

Owing to its new establishment, college has procured a lot of electronic equipment but the same has not been accumulated yet in the form of e-waste. Disposal of e-waste as and when produced shall be done by tendering processes and procedures.

Government Degree College Surankote is in a far flung hilly area of Jammu and Kashmir. As diverse and multifarious is the area so is the composition of students and staff of the college. Students and staff of the college are hailing from diverse backgrounds and have due representation. Average % contribution of reserved category students during the past 5 years showed that more than 50% students are belonging to reserved categories viz., 33% of the students belong to Schedule Tribe (ST), 4.6% students belong to Other Backward Categories (OBC) and 14.4 % of the students enrolled belong to other reserved categories (Reserved Backward Area and Pahari Speaking Category).

Teaching and non-teaching staff is appointed by SSRB (non-gazetted) and PSC (gazetted), strictly follows the reservation policies laid out by the Government of India and is allotted to college by Department of Higher Education, Jammu and Kashmir

Since, there is no restriction from the Government on intake capacity so all the students are admitted.

In order to ensure equal opportunities in all the subjects' merit of the students belonging to reserved categories (ST and SC) is being raised by 5% before generating the final merit list of admission.

Measures for equal opportunities

- Special committees like the SC, ST and OBC Counselling Committee ensure parity and transparency during the admission process.
- Students from lower socio-economic spectrum are helped by financial assistance from the college as needed and various scholarships provided by the Government of India, state governments like scholarship for minority, ST, SC and Pahari Speaking .
- Mentor-mentee meetings are held regularly and students are encouraged to share their problemsacademic or personal – with their mentors.

Teachers adopt bi-lingual mode of teaching, wherever required, to assist students with linguistic challenges. This helps students enhance their academic performance.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

1. TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: Centralised Internal Examination

OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE

1. The main purpose of implementing Centralised Internal Examination scheme is to:

- Bring transparency.
- Timely completion of assessment record.
- Wide coverage of schedule of the internal examination well in time to lower down the absenteeism.
- To maintain the sanctity of examination.

THE CONTEXT

Normally the teacher in charge of each subject was deciding the schedule and mode of conduct of internal examination test as per their own will independently .This method was not productive and fell short on transparency also because:

1. Teachers in charge of subject were taking internal examination at their convenience which was more likely to have chances of lapse of sanctity of examination.

- 2. Students often skipped classes on the pre-text of internal examinations of one subject or others.
- 3. There were chances of clashing and co-inciding of internal examinations of one subject with other.
- 4. Absentees were claiming the non-information of the dates of examinations as there was no uniform schedule, for all the subjects at the same time.

THE PRACTICE

College administration decided to conduct the internal assessment examination in a well planned and schedule manner. Tentative schedule of the internal examination is published in academic calendar well before the start of each session. Internal examination committee framed for the purpose, publishes the centralised date sheet well in time and also assigns examination duties through proper orders. Answer sheets are numbered and marked with machine and allotted to examination centre at the time of examination with proper record. After the completion of examination in each paper, the answer sheets are handed over to subject teacher for evaluation. Outmost care is taken that the subject teacher should not be present in the Examination hall where the examination of the concerned subject is going on. Though the subject teacher is called to clarify the doubts of question paper, if required.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

- 1. The practice has significantly lowered the absentees in internal assessment examination.
- 2. Timely evaluation of assessment has been achieved.
- 3. It led to timely submission of internal assessment examination record for onward submission to affiliating university for timely declaration of result.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

By and large no problem was encountered to implement centralized internal assessment examination scheme and even same resources were utilized but more judiciously.

2. TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: ICT BASED TEACHING & LEARNING

OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE

- To ensure effective learning process by using modern ICT-gadgets.
- To improve the learning outcome of the students by transitioning from traditional methods of teaching to ICT based pedagogy.
- To make teaching more effective with tools like video animations, power point presentations, photomicrographs and other teaching learning software.
- To integrate online library services with the ICT based learning.

THE CONTEXT

The College has made the transition from chalk and talk method of teaching to ICT based pedagogy. This was achieved in line with national policy of digital India. The IQAC had advocated and played a vital role in modernization and up-gradation of class room teaching by way of replacing old and traditional method with electronic gadgets like smart and Interactive boards, LCD projectors, TFT monitors and visualizers. More recently the College has further modernized the ICT gadgetry by incorporating Interactive Large Flat Panel Displays (ILFPD). The gadget has inbuilt key board, magnetic pens and hand operated swipe

options, multi-purpose projection systems and wide angle cameras for lecture recording. These gadgets have proven handy not only in deliverance but also help in development of e-content and digital classrooms.

THE PRACTICE

This year more class rooms were upgraded by way of installation of ICT gadgets like Interactive smart boardsand Large Interactive Flat Panel Display boards. In the last quarter of session 2019-2020 the teachers delivered classes through zoom, Google class room, Wise App and other apps during lockdown due to COVID-19 pandemic. College has subscribed N-List in which more than 1 lakh books and about 6000 journals are available for online learning.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

The evidence of the success can be determined from the fact that strength of students over the years had witnessed a tremendous increase from 198 during the academic session 2012-13 to 1066 in current session. The class rooms remain jam packed. The students from outside catchment area of the college seek admission because of upgraded teaching learning activities in the college. In this respect we are having students from the schools which are otherwise located in other tehsils viz., tehsil Mendhar of district Poonch. During the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent closure of colleges, the faculty switched over to online teaching mode via Google class room and other video conferencing tools. The students easily access the required books from the N-List. The timely completion of syllabus and diverse resources have enriched the performance of students in end-semester examinations.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

Keeping in view the location of the College to the farthest border area of J&K, which render the internet services often suspended and inaccessible, the college has created e-learning resources in the form of recorded lectures and reading material which have been uploaded in YouTube channels of faculty, Wise App and College website so that the students can access the material as and when the internet is available. College shifted to its own building in 2018 and is yet to develop the proportionate infrastructure vis a vis student strength is concerned.

Another problem encountered was that, the stakeholders were not as well acquainted with ICT based teaching and learning tools since the shift was abrupt from conventional methods in the view of sudden and unforeseen emergence of COVID-19 pandemic.

Institutional Distinctiveness

Distinctiveness in Location. Government Degree College Surankote, located in the foothills of Peer Panjal Region, is the only co-educational institution of higher learning in the entire tehsil of Surankote. It is pertinent to mention here that Tehsil Surankote is a remote, border and far-off area of district-Poonch of Jammu and Kashmir spreading over an area of about 250 sq kmwhich includes 245.36 sq kmrural and only 4.87 sq km urban areas. The location of the college is endowed with natural beauty, serenity and tranquillity with a population of about 90298 according to the census of 2011. It has 12 feeding Higher Secondary Schools and all are established in the rural areas. On an average 1800 to 2000 students are passing out from the feeding schools every year and for those who wish to pursue Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, this institution is the only institution nearest to their habitation to mould and empower students of this rural and far-off area in the pursuit of knowledge, values, social responsibility and help them to achieve the excellence in their chosen fields of study in order to face the future challenges. Institution is also running Prime Minister Scholarship Scheme (PMSS) thereby providing opportunities to those who are willing to pursue their studies outside the state as well.

The college started its academic calendar in the year 2012 to bring about a radical change in the society. There is no doubt that this institution has played a pivotal role in providing educational opportunities to the students coming from the rural areas catering to all social and economic backgrounds.

Distinctiveness in Stakeholders. The college has almost 50% students from the reserved categories which is an important and distinctive feature of this institution. Statistical data of the last five years speaks of the average percentage contribution of the reserved categories in the student enrolment as: 33% of the students belong to Schedule Tribe (ST), 4.6% students belong to Other Backward Categories (OBC) and 14.4% of the students enrolled belong to other reserved categories (Reserved Backward Area and Pahari Speaking Category).

The college has earned its reputation for being a premier institution in academics, sports, cultural activities, curricular and extracurricular programmes which is evident from the fact that this institution started its enrolment from 198 in the academic year 2012-13 and after progressively increasing its enrollment during every academic year, has reached the current enrolment of 1066 in the academic year 2021-22. The college administration always strives to instil qualities of sportsmanship, integrity and team spirit in each student through discipline training. This idea encourages our students to move out as confident, fearless and fit in all domains of life.

The institution also provides a secure haven for female students to develop their innate strengths. A vibrant Women Development Cell is in place. Girls students have 40-45% of enrollment share among the total student strength of the college over the years. There is a constant focus on disseminating quality education and ensuring uplifting of all students of the college. The college reinforces and consolidates efforts to make the mission of equal education to students of reserve categories a reality. Maximum students are getting benefits of Scholarship Scheme. Those whoiare not having reserved categories are getting benefits of minority scholarship schemes. It is believed that the wealth of a nation lies in the

quality of education provided to students and this institution contributes in the same spirit to achieve excellence.

The college has some important units like NCC, NSS, Rovers & Rangers, EBSB Club, Red Ribbon club which have developed a distinctive approach towards service to society. The main purpose of establishing these units in the college is to develop the students' ethical and human values. All possible efforts are made to sensitize the students in developing relationship between an individual and society. The student community has been given opportunities to help the victims of natural disasters and calamities.

The students of this college have shown their exceptional performance in academics also. Pass percentage of students has witnessed an exponential increase from semester-I (entry level) to final semester (exit level). The college has made all efforts to engage the teaching faculty in remedial teaching. The system of remedial teaching was initiated in the campus keeping in view the rural background of students and the approaches undertaken during remedial teaching proved successful in catering to the needs of the slow learners. Special mentor-mentee groups are in place which help a lot in mentoring the students to get handle of stress and associated problems and prepare themselves for competitive examinations and overall personality development.

The College encourages its faculty and students to participate in seminars and conferences and promote a holistic teaching-learning environment. They are further facilitated by our infrastructural facilities including a fully functional computer lab/Browsing Centre, well-stocked library, a multipurpose hall equipped with multi-media facility and gymnasium. In order to improve IT infrastructure and teaching methodology, the college has also turned the traditional class room to smart class room. In addition to this, the college facilitates regular interactions through seminars, workshops, special extension lectures, field trips etc. for a wholesome and comprehensive exposure to our students.

This college is very young in age as only 10 years have passed since its inception in 2011. Upto 2018 only Bachelor of Arts programme was running in the college. Bachelor of Science had been started in 2018-19 and only one batch of BSc has passed out in academic session 2020-21. Student growth over the year speaks of the wide potential the college is having owing to its location. In 2019 college started functioning in its own building and started developing the infrastructure of laboratories, library, class rooms and offices at a greater pace than that of earlier because in Govt Higher Secondary School Boys Mendhar college was having very limited space to keep the infrastructure. After 2019 a greater chunk of time has been consumed by COVID-19 pandemic. In the changing scenario of New Education Policy and global demand of ICT based teaching learning college has begun with remarkable opening. Still there is a long inning to be played and college vision and mission is all set to achieve the same.

Concluding Remarks :

In the global village concept nothing can be run in isolation. Govt Degree College Surankote is also running in collaboration with civil society, Indian Armed Forces, administrative Department and District Administration for achieving the prime objective of shaping the human capital. It has always provided the infrastructural support to the wide range of activities be it in conduct of parliamentary, assembly and local body elections, conduct of competitive examinations. The College provides the infrastructural support to both Govt. and non-Govt. Organizations viz. providing auditorium facility for conducting various programmes of general importance. During the times of COVID-19 pandemic, the college offered its building for COVID Care centre and also provided its bus for transportation of patients as per the direction of District administration. The NSS and NSS volunteers have awared the general public about the COVID protocol in door-to-door campaign. College has a well-set vision, acting upon which Detailed Project Report (DPRs) of separate Science Block, Gymnasium, Hostel, Chowkidar Hut have already been submitted to Department of Higher Education for Approval and release of funds.
